

The first play for 2010 is **Disclosure**, an intriguing drama, by local playwright Helen Collins, and is directed by that well known HTC personality, Maureen McInerney who is assisted by Margaret Hassall.

Disclosure is set in Melbourne in the present time and involves five seemingly unrelated women from different walks of life. As their personal histories unfold we discover they connect in a fascinating underbelly of lies, deceit, and murder.

The play is structured in five scenes, where we hear the main characters gradually disclose their secrets:

It opens with a Detective Inspector interrogating a possible murder suspect. The next scene we see the same Detective Inspector in a therapy session with a psychiatrist – the tables being turned to show the interrogator now being interrogated.

The third scene has the therapist confiding to her friend about life, love and betrayal, and the fourth scene has that friend being interrogated by a fellow prison inmate as they both await further questioning on the mysterious deaths that have occurred.

The final scene wraps it all up – but the question is have we really discovered the truth, or have we been left with another layer of lies and deceit?

The script was submitted to La Mama who then staged it in 2006, and interestingly, in that

production, Emma, the daughter of our Secretary Brett Hunt, was the Stage Manager.

Rehearsals are well underway, with a great cast lined up for the show;

As *Gina Sturrock*, the Police Inspector, we welcome again Margaret Moloney who appeared in **Grace** a few years ago at Heidelberg, as well as **Bazaar and Rummage**.

We also have another HTC regular – Lena Minto is playing the first suspect, *Anne Carson*. Lena's most recent appearance on stage was in **Over the River and Through the Woods**.

We have a few newcomers to Heidelberg. As *Glenda Hartley*, the therapist, we have Tricia McCann. Cathy Patti is playing her "friend", *Susan Riley*, and Natasha Boyd has the role of *Holly Briscoe*, a fellow prison inmate (or is she?).

Cameron South is doing a double act as the Stage Manager, and also the small role of *Tom*, the Police Constable – you may have seen him before in **Angels**, and **Don's Party**.

Set building is screaming along, managed by Owen Evans who has rounded up the usual suspects to assist. Siobhan Early, a behind-thescenes regular is back as Assistant Stage Manager. Callum Robertson, George Bissett and Margaret Hassall will manage the sound and lights for the show.

So don't miss this chance to see a great new Australian play.

The Philadelphia Story by Philip Barry

3CR's **CURTAIN UP** Sundays at One (855 AM)

While I have seen both screen versions of Philip Barry's celebrated play, this is the first time I have seen **The Philadelphia Story** on stage in its original form. This is the play that brought Katherine Hepburn back to the screen and where she remained as a major star for the next 50 years. Set in the 1930s it tells of rather selfish socialite *Tracy Lord* and how in the lead up to her second marriage she finally discovers just what true love means.

This is a gentle, yet sophisticated comedy that has lots of style and gives us a glimpse of the manners and morals of upperclass American society at that time and in some ways was quite advanced as shown by the occasional line. It is also a longish play by today's standards and requires a distinct acting style quite unlike today's more naturalistic approach.

The play also provides some very good roles for its leading players and the production has some very nice performances in particular Aimee Sanderson in the central and demanding role of *Tracy*, she never tried to mimic either Hepburn or Grace Kelly, she put her own stamp on the role, showing us the almost 'ice-maiden' and unforgiving side of her character gradually softening into the understanding of the human frailties of both herself and others.... and boy was she glamorous, wearing the elegant 1930's gowns so naturally. Bruce Carboon had a nice relaxed style with pertinent input as Tracy's first husband, *Dexter*. I also enjoyed the performance of Peter Newling as Tracy's brother *Sandy Lord*, this character is so important to the story, but sadly was cut out of the musical version which did change the plot slightly.

While I felt there was a little unevenness in the supporting roles a little more character development by both director and cast would have firmed this up. We did see solid work from Tom Travers as *Tracy*'s father, *Seth Lord*, John Cheshire as the bottom-pinching *Uncle Willie*, Jo Warr as *Tracy*'s mother, *Margaret Lord* and Basileira Paras as the younger sister *Dinah*.


Heidelberg's production under the direction of John Keogh was quite stylish aided by John Shelbourn's very elegant set design and upper-class furnishings (cream, some mauve and burgundy). Costumes, props etc were generally of the usual high standard seen at Heidelberg. I also like the choice of music that underscored on occasion. Lighting was a little patchy in particular up stage left in the grand piano/telephone area which left faces in shadow.

To sum up, a well written play, not in the screwball comedy style that we associate with the 1930s but still very entertaining and it is good that we can have the opportunity to see these classics, no four letter words, and a play with a beginning, middle and end, I'm surprised we haven't seen a professional revival – these older plays get re-staged on Broadway from time to time, why not here

Review – HTC Youth's Alice

The perennial issues surrounding **Alice** are (A) is it really for young children and (B) how well does it really hang together as a unified piece? We grown ups with hindsight realise it shrieks of political overtones and to be absolutely fair – this production was never billed as a pantomime. I would have been disappointed if a group of 25 young people didn't give the story a real edge. It still always seems to me a series of fairly unrelated scenes.

If one reads this story to a child, it depends on the imagination of the child how he/she pictures the characters. There they are visual and the children have them in full costume and make-up and looking very real. A couple looked very intimidating but on Saturday afternoon, I saw no one leave.

Now to the Production.

Michelle has done an excellent job. She has worked hard and it shows, managed a huge cast admirably, many of them very young. *Alice* is only 14 years old. Well done Olivia. The tea party was very cleverly directed and played. Congrats to Luke and Toni. Julia's *Queen of Hearts* reminded me of a domatrix – good work – and Jessica's *White Rabbit* was a treat.

The whole ensemble worked well as did the set, music and lights (where were Jefferson Airplane and The Beatles)?

Costumes and make-up were professionally done. Our Youth Group continues to go from strength to strength.
